A Plea for Pillowcases

Several Rochester alums involved with Angels of Mercy, Inc. are working to "Dress A Girl Around the World." Dresses are made from pillowcases or fabric, new or gently used, and many include a little doll or stuffed animal in a pocket. These dresses provide a level of protection from sex trafficking in Third World countries. Traffickers prey upon girls – and boys – with ragged, dirty or torn clothing. When traffickers see girls in nice dresses they know someone cares for them.

In the United States there are about 350,000 girls who have been brought into the country and sold into trafficking – some as young as three years old!

So far 13,808 dresses have been delivered to 34 countries. The group tries to find missionaries or groups going to these countries to personally deliver the dresses to the girls. For further information, visit www.dressagirlaroundtheworld.org.

Friday evening all were welcomed in true Southern style to a meet and greet cocktail buffet. Saturday morning attendees headed to the Academy of the Sacred Heart, and for many, including myself, this was the first visit to the school that lies on holy ground. EASTERN REGIONAL CELEBRATES COR UNUM BY ALICE J. BURNS, EASTERN REGIONAL DIRECTOR

Bryn Mawr Country Day School welcomed more than 30 alumnae and two RSCJ October 8–9 to the Eastern Regional Conference: *Celebrating Cor Unum: Living the Vision of Sophie and Philippine*. Conference Chair Betty Rexford Buckland and her committee crafted a weekend of art history, sharing experiences of Cor Unum by associations and individuals, socializing and more.

Louise Meière Dunn (Greenwich '48) and her daughter, Hilly Meière Dunn (Greenwich '77), presented a slide show and narrative chronicling the life of Hildreth Meière, artist, muralist, mosaicist and AASH President (1957-59). The scope and breadth of her work is stunning. I had no idea of the artist behind the medallions at Rockefeller Center that I viewed almost daily for years walking to and from work.

The centerpiece of the weekend was a presentation on Living the Vision of Sophie and Philippine composed of six alumnae: Joan Meaney Quinn (Overbrook '47), Edith Niedringhaus Phelan (Overbrook '48), Eileen Byrne Barrett (Overbrook '61), Kathy Peebles Green (Overbrook '64), Mary Locke Cavallaro (Bryn Mawr '86) and Kate Reynolds (Bryn Mawr '05). What resonated from each alum is the strength of heart, mind and character with which she has lived and continues to live her life. It was both heartening and thrilling to hear the unstinting – and successful – efforts of alumnae to save Bryn Mawr from closure in the early '70s. It was even more heartening to listen to the tributes to these women and all the alumnae who played so important a role in giving them the gift of a Sacred Heart education.

Liturgy was celebrated in the Bryn Mawr chapel where four wooden Hildreth Meière panels adorn the walls. The weekend was capped off with dinner at the Philadelphia Country Club. Some even enjoyed a ride in a horse-drawn pumpkin!

REGION CENTRAL Patricia Eldredge Kolojeski, Grosse Pointe, Class of 1962

Loveliness and grace might mask the thoroughgoing commitment and strength of Patricia Eldredge Kolojeski. Those who know her through the nine national and nine regional AASH conferences she has attended might not guess that she

excelled as a medical/surgical and delivery room registered nurse, started and ran an estate sale business for 28 years, was an early volunteer of SHEP, a summer enrichment program for children in Detroit, begun by Annette Zipple, RSCJ, a member of the Inter Faith Council for Racial Justice, and a volunteer at the Teen Methadone Clinic.

It is much easier for us to see Patricia as the loving and devoted wife of Tom Kolojeski for 44 years, a wonderful mother of Martha and Tom, Jr., an adoring grandmother of four, and a committed member of her parish church. But most know Patricia as the model image of Grosse Pointe Alumnae of the Sacred Heart. When the school was on the brink of being closed and demolished in 1969, a core group of alumnae and parents succeeded in purchasing the school and property and bringing on a lay board. While it would no longer be the beloved girls academy generations had cherished since 1885, alumnae committed their energy to preserving and proclaiming the values and even the traditions of "Sacred Heart."

The incarnation, Grosse Pointe Academy, an independent coed elementary school, still shows in every corridor and every publication its Sacred Heart roots. The depth of that heritage was showcased in October when Patricia spearheaded a 125th anniversary celebration at the school.

In 2009 the Grosse Pointe Alumni Association presented Patricia with the Coeur de L'Enfant Award in recognition of a life that embraces the ideals of St. Madeleine Sophie Barat and the philosophy of Sacred Heart education. Now AASH caps that recognition in proudly presenting her to be recognized nationally for living in the Heart with the Central Region Cor Unum Award for 2011.



SOUTHERN REGION Rosemary Holland Gidionsen, Maryville University, Class of 1950

Rosemary Holland Gidionsen's life has been framed and graced by her Sacred Heart experience.

Rosemary has said, as many alums recount, that she had a fine Catholic

education before entering college, but from her first day at Maryville she experienced learning and being at a whole new exalted, grace-filled level. Mother Odeide Mouton walking down the hall was enough to lift up her heart. In gratitude she returned to serve the University for 35 years.

After working as a fashion and freelance artist, and while raising her five children, Rosemary followed in the footsteps of her aunt, Dorothy Garesche Holland, Class of 1926, who was the first Alumnae Director at Maryville. Rosemary expanded her work beyond alumni to direct Parent Relations and Constituent Relations. In 1977, she moved to the position of Executive Assistant to the President. All the while, Rosemary's main goal was, in the words of one of her supporters, "to bridge the past with the present to ensure the values on which Maryville was built continued to thrive." She saw, in Janet Erskine Stuart's words, the job was not to do what our forebears did but to do what they would do today.

Another remarkable Rosemary, Rosemary O'Neil of Chicago, writes, "She is blessed with the gift of thoughtful substantive support for the Sacred Heart tradition, which she expresses with considerable persuasion and charm. She has been a superb advocate of Sacred Heart standards as the world of Maryville has evolved."

Sister Shirley Miller credits that considerable persuasion and charm, along with Rosemary's deep commitment, for recently helping secure from the Maryville Board of Trustees a \$100,000 gift to the RSCJ In Mission for Life Campaign.

With one nominator calling her "a magnificent human being and the apotheosis of Sacred Heart values" and her children rising up to call her blessed, the committee easily chose Rosemary Holland Gidionsen as the Southern Region's 2011 Cor Unum Award winner.

EASTERN REGION Toni Walsh Curry– Newton Country Day, Class of 1968



A lmost before she knew enough to say no to so much responsibility, Toni Walsh Curry served as President of the AASH, from 1981-1983. Since then, and serving her six years on the Board of Directors, she has remained a steadfast and enthusi-

astic supporter, advisor, and hands-on worker for AASH, while always blessed with the love, support and guidance of Sister Marie-Louise Wolfington, RSCJ a friend, confidant and an invaluable mentor.

Toni recalls the AASH conference in St. Louis in 1979 when she was not quite 30 years old. She and Jeanne Burke O'Fallon were to be the young alums responding to the remarks of two RSCJ giants: Odeide Mouton and Rita Karam. Toni confessed to wondering as the nuns spoke what in the world she was doing there. Now she says she knows: she was becoming a part of a remarkable group that has guided and enriched her life for the past 31 years.

While raising two sons, Timothy and Christopher, with her husband, Brian, and moving to New Jersey, Maryland, and finally back to Massachusetts, teaching special needs students, working and detailing events through Curry Event Specialists, Inc. and presently in incentive sales for T. R. Miller Co., Toni has always put service at the heart of her days.

Among her numerous causes have been Caritas Good Samaritan Hospice in Brighton, Mass. where among many volunteer jobs she endowed in her mother's honor "Nanny's Nook," a bereavement resource center for children. In addition she has served on the Parent's Council at Boston College, co-chairing two consecutive Parents' Weekends and organized the Chilmark Red Bandana 5K Runners in memory of a Boston College alum who perished 9/11.

But the heart of Toni's service has been her service to Sacred Heart. Eastern Regional Director Alice Burns calls Toni "a whirling dervish for all things Sacred Heart" and adds, "Her spirit is contagious and unflagging." Alice witnessed this when Toni formed the Southeast Massachusetts, Cape Cod and the Islands AASH group in 2008. The association's first event was hosted with her Newton classmate and dear friend of 50 years Katie McGregor Lannan.

Treasures from the Aeart

In a letter dated June, 1984, Frances Savage Keenan wrote from Michigan, sending some holy cards her mother, Adelia Carey Savage, had collected. Adelia attended the Convent of the Sacred Heart in London, Ontario, Canada from 1877-1885. Frances entrusted several intricate, fragile and beautiful holy cards, exchanged among Academy students on holidays or used as birthday greetings. Along with them came letters written by the nuns to Adelia. The handwriting and careful choice of words remind of days gone by, and the letters are precious examples of the bond between students and their loving Sacred Heart mothers.

Adelia, Frances wrote, was a charter member of the Detroit Alumnae, and died at the age of 90 in 1957, "still talking of the love of all the children of the Sacred Heart so expressed by these cards and letters. No great world events, just another example of the love and caring which exists in all branches of the Society."

Now still in good condition at 125 years old, these holy cards are lovely expressions and evidence of a Sacred Heart family.

PAST PRESIDENT PROFILE

Maryliz de Vito Lincoln



Maryliz deVito Lincoln served as AASH President from 1999-2001.

While Maryliz deVito Lincoln did not experience Sacred Heart education until she arrived at San Francisco College for Women, Lone Mountain, her gratitude for those four years remained constant in a faithful alumna who served as President of AASH from 1999-2001.

Maryliz graduated from her beloved Lone Mountain in 1965 and took the lessons learned and

the love shared there and lived it out in her joyous service and extraordinary generosity to local alumni groups, nationally through AASH, and internationally to AMASC (Association Mondiales des Anciens/nes du Sacré Coeur). She was a Child of Mary, an Associate of the Society of the Sacred Heart and a great friend of the RSCJ retirement community at Oakwood.

During her tenure as President, Maryliz spread great joy and contagious enthusiasm. She oversaw an outstanding conference in San Francisco and loved composing for *Esprit de Coeur*, contributing to many creative stories and features.

Maryliz loved and really believed in AMASC: "It is truly an international family bond and how blessed we are to be part." She described AMASC this way, "I recall the years when AMASC came to the United States for the first time. It was 1978 and Miriam Gray was elected in Dublin, Ireland. Miriam asked me to be her Secretary-General ... When we returned to the U.S. our first mission was to explain AMASC to the country. During that time, AMASC published a newsletter and it was my job to see that it was sent to the National Presidents, in their language of choice: English, French or Spanish. I well remember typing the newsletter on a typewriter - no computers in those days! Not only no computers, but we had to rely on communications between the countries and AMASC via mail - no email, no fax! All of this had to be done on a very strict budget." Our recent improvements in communication email for life, online community and eblasting - would have made Maryliz very proud!

An only child, Maryliz buried two husbands and a stepdaughter (she also had a stepson). Sacred Heart literally became her family. "My Sacred Heart family – locally, nationally and internationally – has been such a source of strength for me at so many times in my life," she said.

Maryliz was a great and joyous gift giver, always remembering birthdays and special occasions with cards or flowers. She was devoted to the Little Sisters of the Poor and at Christmas asked residents to tell what each wanted. She then she shopped for the exact choices – for about 70 people – and wrapped each gift! Her husband Donald couldn't believe this and joined in the wrapping.

Maryliz died Nov. 27, 2003, suddenly, of an apparent heart attack. At the time, Maryliz was serving as AMASC Vice President, alongside her dear friend and AMASC President, Olga Seiferth Rome, The Rosary '53. At her funeral in San Francisco, Olga said, "People praised Maryliz as a woman of courage, bravery, strength, loyalty, dedication and commitment; the consummate care-giver who was always doing things for others; a woman of outstanding character, valiant, heroic, gentle, kind, compassionate and generous, who cherished her family and her innumerable

friends! Her devotion to the Religious of the Sacred Heart and a deep appreciation of her Sacred Heart education permeated her very being," said Olga.

"Maryliz was a remarkable woman, fun, competent and so loving," wrote Kathleen Hughes, RSCJ, who was serving as U.S. Provincial at the time.

In her honor, the Maryliz deVito Lincoln Generosity and Service Award was established. It allows a alumna or alumnus, 35 or younger, who has demonstrated outstanding support of and loyalty to her/his alumnae/i association to attend an AASH conference. The remainder of Maryliz's bequest is carefully invested by AASH but it serves in the same way the donor did. Whenever there is a special need or a serious shortfall, a Board member will say, "We can always go to Maryliz." In life and in death, AASH has relied on Maryliz.

"In one remarkable life, AASH saw a model alumna and leader," said Barbara Brown Lopiccolo, who was AASH president when Maryliz died. "May each of us follow her sterling example: to let giving be our joy, wisdom be our aim, and faith be our guide." AASH is most grateful for the generosity, joy, wisdom and faith of Maryliz deVito Lincoln.


Walking Together Toward a Better World: The Society and the United Nations

HELEN ROSENTHAL, RSCJ

"Do you love the Lord enough to go on missions for him?" asked the Mother General of Helen Rosenthal, an RSCJ in Romein1959. Thusbegan Sister Rosenthal's 20-year journey as a missionary.

A child of the Sacred Heart through and through, Sister Rosenthal graduated from the Academy of the Sacred Heart in St. Charles and is an alumna of Maryville University in St. Louis. She entered the Society at Kenwood in 1950 after which she was assigned to work at a number of schools in the Network including Villa Duchesne in St. Louis, the Rosary in New Orleans and Clifton in Cincinnati, where she doubled the enrollment of the primary school during her stay. As a probanist, Sister Rosenthal was sent to the Trinita as Sacristan for Mater. It was here that Mother Benziger, Assistant General, guided Sister Rosenthal to her mission in Chile.

Just after final vows in February of 1960, Sister Rosenthal traveled to Viña del Mar where, like Rose Philippine Duchesne, she arrived in a new country with little knowledge of the language or customs. Before leaving Rome, she asked one of the Spanish nuns how to ask for a blessing from the Superior in Spanish! From those first few words, Sister Rosenthal journeyed through 20 years of doing "a little bit of everything." She began working in the middle school; she taught English to third and fourth graders, even translating the Scott Foresman Reader for them. Sister Rosenthal grew into the roles of Surveillante General for the whole school, division head of the grade school and later on became Head of School, which soon had over 600 students. Then she was sent to Concepcion, where the provincial asked her to merge the grade school and the free school. Later on, after having attended the Institute for Religious Formation at St. Louis University in 1973-1974, she became Spiritual Director for the 19 RSCJ communities in Chile, taking on the role of Superior for the community in Talca in the south, and local superior of the community in Coquimbo, the poorest region in the north.

Sister Rosenthal's journey, like that of Philippine, was not without its challenges. Because only two of the RSCJ in the four large schools in Chile had degrees, Sister Rosenthal was asked to



get a degree while in Chile. While working full-time in the schools, she received two Master's degrees (Education and Guidance and Counseling) attending night classes at the Catholic University of Valparaiso, Chile. In 1965, an earthquake struck the area, destroying the convent that was soon declared uninhabitable by the Navy. Sister Rosenthal had to move the entire school first to a house lent to them by the bishop and later to pre-fabricated cabins, which the school used for the next four years until its permanent move to the Reñaca location in 1969. Later on, Sister Rosenthal contracted the Hong Kong flu. As a result of the high fever, or of the medication used to treat it, the nerve endings in both ears were severely damaged rendering her partially deaf in both ears. Sister Rosenthal learned to communicate very successfully by reading lips.

Upon returning to the U.S. after ister Rosenthal earned her doctorate in

20 years in Chile, Sister Rosenthal earned her doctorate in Historical Theology from St. Louis University. In 1986, she made the move to Miami, where she chose to continue her journey at St. Thomas University. During her first year there, she established the Center for Spirituality, the training Program for Spiritual Directors, and the Post-Masters Certificate Program in Spirituality. Later, she also served as Chair of the Department of History, Philosophy, and Religious Studies. Additionally, Sister Rosenthal created the International Online Certificate Program in Spirituality Studies through which she works with students all over the world. Now, retired since September, Sister Rosenthallives in a community of four in South Miami and hopes to spend much of her time writing. In addition to actively maintaining a daily blog (www.reflectionsofanrscj.blogspot.com), she has been asked to research and write about our Sacred Heart pioneer mothers.

Because of her undying fidelity to the call of God to be a missionary and make known God's love throughout the world, we are proud to recognize Sister Helen Rosenthal as the 2011 Woman of Conscience Award recipient.

Sister Rosenthal will be offering a seminar on Friday, April 8 titled *The Adventures of Lucile Mathevon, RSCJ – Early Companion of Philippine.*

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Carrollton School of the Sacred Heart El Jardin – A Home of God's Heart

Overlooking Biscayne Bay, El Jardin is the earliest known, full-fledged Mediterranean Revival building in Miami. This impressive house was originally built in 1918 as a winter home for John Bindley, president of the Pittsburgh Steel Company. Designed by Richard Kiehnel of the prominent architectural firm of Kiehnel and Elliott, the building is noted for its rich detail and outstanding craftsmanship. El Jardin was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1974.



Today, El Jardin is the heart of the Barat Campus of Carrollton School of the Sacred Heart. Founded in 1961, Carrollton is the only preK-12 all girls school in the state of Florida. Realizing the unique developmental needs at each stage of girls' and young women's learning, Carrollton serves 800 students. The school encompasses five independent learning communities: Montessori, Primary, Intermediate, Junior High and High School, all of which foster the growth of girls and young women.
