

Alumnae Leave a Legacy for AASH

Last July AASH lost a loyal alumna, Mary Kay Tracy Farley. She was a generous donor to AASH throughout her life and was especially generous in leaving a legacy gift of \$10,000 in unrestricted funds. Her gift was from the heart.

A graduate of the Academy of the Sacred Heart, Grosse Pointe, and Manhattanville College, Mary Kay continued on to Loyola (Chicago) University School of Social Work. She was president of the Manhattanville College Alumni Association and was the recipient of Manhattanville's Distinguished Alumna Award. Manhattanville again honored her in 2012 with the Outstanding Alumna Service Award.

Among Mary Kay's far-reaching philanthropic interests, education ranked high. She was a former trustee of Barry University in Miami and Manhattan College in the Bronx. As an anniversary gift to her husband in 1985, Mary Kay established the James Farley Scholarship presented annually to one male and one female student athlete at Jim's high school alma mater. The Farleys endowed scholarships at other educational institutions as well.

Mary Kay was a 2007 Cor Unum recipient. In her tribute to Mary Kay, the late Sister Mary T. Clark, RSCJ, said, "Mary Kay finds happiness in providing it for others. On her 'card' Mary Kay calls herself: Wife, Mother, Sportswoman, Philanthropist. This last word contains *philia* (love) and *anthropos* (human kind), i.e., a lover of human persons. Literally understood, philanthropy is an ideal made real with God's grace, and aptly describes Mary Kay's priorities."

AASH has also recently learned of the death of Marcelline Chartz Smith in October. Marcie had been a generous donor to AASH over the years and her philanthropy continued after her death, as she named AASH in her will.

Marcie graduated from San Francisco College for Women, Lone Mountain in 1947 with a degree in mathematics. She then embarked on a 44-year career with NASA as a systems engineer, eventually rising to Division Chief at Ames Research Center in Mountain View, Calif. Twice she received NASA's Exceptional Service Medal for her leadership in establishing Ames Research Center as the Agency's central computer facility and the leading center of large computers. Marcie was a pioneer, paving the way for women in the field of computer science and aeronautics.

Alumna to Head Duchesne Academy, Omaha

Following a national search, Meg Huerter Brudney was the unanimous choice for Duchesne, Omaha's next Head of School. She will begin on June 1, 2015 and is the first alumna to hold this position in the school's more than 130-year history.

"It is more than a position; it is my calling," said Meg. "The alumnae who have reached out to encourage my candidacy have been true foundations and support. I am overwhelmed and humbled by the kindness."

Following graduation from Duchesne in 1983, Meg earned her bachelor's degree in communication from University of Kansas, Lawrence and has completed many management courses such as the Kellogg School of Management Leadership Academy and Notre Dame's Executive Transformation Nonprofit Leadership.

Meg has most recently served as an executive director of the Cristo Rey Jesuit High School in Minneapolis. Previous roles included director of marketing and communications in non-profits such as hospitals and medical clinics.

Esprit de Coeur Goes Green

One of the main goals of each Board is to keep members informed. The *Esprit de Coeur* (EdeC) has been and continues to be our primary communication tool. It is wonderful way to share news and pictures about all the activities occurring in the various AASH regions and communities. The Board, in carefully considering its responsibility to the environment and its fiscal responsibility to its membership, has decided to change the EdeC's distribution method.

The average issue of EdeC mailed to our members uses a total of just under 950,000 pages of paper. It is expensive to produce in its current format and mailing costs increase almost annually. On average it costs over \$50,000 per year to produce the usual two issues, which translates to nearly 40% of our overall annual operating expenses. We wish to make better use of the important and significant investments made in our web site and database during the prior two biennia.

Starting with the Spring/Summer 2015 issue of *Esprit de Coeur*, hard copies will be mailed only to our alumnae/i who graduated from an academy school prior to 1955 or from a college prior to 1959. All other alumnae/i will receive an electronic copy via email. Please be sure to visit www.aashnet.org to request a user name and password so that you may update or confirm that our records include your current email address.

The Esprit de Coeur also will be posted to the AASH website (www.aashnet.org) and to our Facebook page (AASH - Associated Alumnae and Alumni of the Sacred Heart) so it will be accessible to all our members. A small number of hard copies also will be mailed to each of our member associations for reference or distribution. You may request to receive EdeC by hard copy by contacting our National Office at 314-569-3948 or NationalOffice@aashnet.org. Conversely, if you are among those scheduled to receive a hard copy and would prefer electronic copy only, please notify the National Office.

Please know that this decision was reached after much discussion and reflection. As your representatives, we take our responsibilities seriously and want to serve as good stewards of AASH. We believe that this change to distributing primarily in an electronic format will serve the environment well. The resulting cost savings will help ensure that we can continue the operations of AASH far into the future and meet the needs of our growing alumnae/i population.

"The Calling of Mother Adelli" By Zoe Marhoefer Keithley, Lake Forest '51

In this new novel by Zoe Marhoefer Keithley, a young girl shakes up the life of the Convent of the Sacred Heart in Lake Forest, Ill.

In 1948, a prominent surgeon leaves his 10-yearold daughter Helene Rhenehan in the care of a young nun at a Chicago-area boarding school.


Mother Mary Agnes Adelli, newly appointed mistress of the Third Cours or middle school, is deeply challenged by Helene, a fearful and angry girl who is distraught by the recent death of her mother and her father's departure for a planned working trip to Italy.

Helene's unhappiness causes strife for the school, and especially for the 28-year-old nun who is moving toward taking her final vows but whose attention is soon turned toward helping the troubled young student. The story explores how discipline, reason, good intentions and prayer can help Helene. It also explores the challenges of loyalty versus conscience and personal freedom. Though set in a different era, the issues addressed in "The Calling of Mother Adelli" are certainly relevant now.

Available through Amazon in paperback or Kindle format, the book is getting enthusiastic reviews from readers who describe Zoe's writing as

elegant and poetic. The cover features photos taken of the 1903-era convent shortly before the building was demolished in 2014.

She has written several other books including "3/Chicago" (2013) and "Crow Song" (2009). A third-generation Sacred Heart alumna, Zoe earned her bachelor's of English from Trinity University in Washington, D.C. She earned her master's of arts in The Teaching of Writing from Columbia College, Chicago. She taught for more than 20 years at Northeastern Illinois University and now lives in Sacramento, Calif.

"My Escape: Memoirs of a Hungarian Teenage Freedom Fighter"

Before arriving in the United States, Esther Kandó Odescalchi lived an entirely different life and wrote about it in her native Hungarian. It was a grim time in communist-occupied Eastern Europe. In 1956, as revolution churned in the air, she and seven other young refugees made the risky escape from Russian-occupied Hungary over the border into Austria. It was a difficult journey. Local guides no longer were willing to help those wanting to escape west. Trains were destroyed and non-locals were detained. Russian soldiers searched homes for those looking to flee.

Esther wrote "My Escape" in 1956, just after her arrival in Vienna. She translated it into English 50 years later. She completed her education in the United States, attending Manhattanville College in Purchase, N.Y., where she earned a bachelor's degree in English literature. She went on to earn her master's in library science at Columbia University and a doctorate in communications

at Clayton University. She worked in executive communications at IBM and was grant consultant of the Greater New York Library System. She is author of numerous technical and nontechnical articles, three books and a play. She lectures and conducts



workshops in the United States and abroad. She is also a professional ballroom dancer with a Dance Master's certificate. She lives in Pleasant Valley, N.Y.

ARIZONA + AMASC + AASH = Terrific Times

An Overview of the AMASC Congress

"Listening with One Heart" was the theme of the AMASC Congress held in Scottsdale, Ariz. from November 6-9, 2014. AMASC (Association Mondiale des Anciennes et Anciens du Sacré Coeur) President Pam Moore Snyder greeted the Congress attendees in a letter that said, "...we have come here to listen to the heartbeat of God as we listen to one another." The Arizona Alumnae Association generously supported the infrastructure of the Congress; this included services such as registration, evening events and liturgical coordination. Besides Pam Snyder, three other North Americans served on the AMASC Board: Barbara Brown Lopiccolo, Vice-President; Wendy Delery Hills, Treasurer, and Maureen Elliott, Secretary-General.

Alumnae and alumni from 30-plus nations made the Scottsdale Resort and Conference Center their home for the four-day meeting. Sister Barbara Dawson, Provincial for Canada and the United States, greeted the national presidents at their full-day business meeting. A procession of the nations' flags preceded the opening liturgy at Saint Maria Goretti Church in Scottsdale. Later liturgies were celebrated in French and under the stars incorporating Native American culture.

Sister Kathleen Hughes, former Provincial for the RSCJ in the United States, offered a keynote address that explored the differences between listening and hearing. Fr. George Coyne, SJ, formerly of the Vatican Observatory, discoursed on the relationship between religion and science. Other presentations focused on the crisis of healthy waters, the new social media app of the Religious known as "Call Me Back," and the innovative outreach program of Bloomfield Hills students to provide books to children in need around the world. As the Ugandan association was formally admitted into AMASC, the audience rose in applause and celebration.

When attendees were not engaged in sessions, they were shopping at Le Marché du Sacré Coeur. Here they could buy products and keepsakes from all over the globe – everything from Ugandan jewelry to medals and notecards from the USA. As this was a meeting of the Children of the Sacred Heart, there were frequent and festive dining events. A Western themed dinner with line dancing lessons and a final closing gala with flags and national costumes dazzled and delighted everyone.

The AASH Perspective on the Congress

Approximately 50 U.S. and Canadian alums joined the Congress. A combined regional meeting for the four U.S. regions allowed each Regional Director to meet and greet attendees from her region. Jodie Hannaman Thorne (Southern

Region), Caitie O'Shea (Western Region), Roselie Bellanca Posselius (Central Region), and Rhonda Raffi Meegan (Eastern Region), shared updates on their respective regions and invited input from the audience. Toni Walsh Curry, co-chair of the AASH National Conference in Boston, offered an exciting preview of the conference and responded to audience questions. Hosting a regional meeting at an AMASC Congress was an historic first.

Creating a Video Documentary

At its June 2014 meeting, the Board of Directors of AASH agreed to create a video documentary containing interviews of alums. It is intended that this video be a dynamic, growing archive of how our alumnae and alumni interpret the legacy of their Sacred Heart educations. Regional Director Roselie Posselius began the video "conversations" at the AMASC meeting. Accompanied by her videographer, Roselie filmed nearly 25 individuals during the Congress. The video will be available for general viewing at the Boston conference, and the collection of video interviews will continue. AASH will post small portions of the video on its website and make a larger version available on YouTube. Ultimately, this video will record the impressions of Sacred Heart women and men, young and old.

EASTERN REGION
Eugenie "Mimi" O'Hagan,
Eden Hall 1948, Newton College 1951

Mimi O'Hagan's commitment to education, the poor and the unity of the Sacred Heart international community has been a gift to all who know her. Her drive and compassion, along with her joie de vivre and spirituality, define the heart of Cor Unum, says nominator Susan Burke-O'Neal,

Director of Alumnae Relations & Associate Director of Development at Convent of the Sacred Heart (91st Street) in New York City.

An accomplished businesswoman, Mimi worked in communications, public relations and development during her long, interesting career. Her work ranged from Dwight D. Eisenhower's presidential campaign to corporate public relations at Schweppes. She also worked at several nonprofits such as Project Hope, The Freedom Institute, Oxford University Press and the American Association of Publishers. She has been a wonderful presence and booster at 91st Street. In the 1970s, she decided the Sacred Heart community could strengthen its international connections and created Entente Sacré Coeur, an international reciprocal exchange program for upper school students with their counterparts in Sacred Heart schools in Europe. She also helped cultivate the alumnae and development offices and produced the first annual report of giving for 91st Street.

Mimi officially retired in 2000, but she was just finding her stride when it comes to helping others. While building houses for Habitat for Humanity in Ethiopia in 2006, she was so moved by the sight of an impoverished child collecting water at a stream, she came back and contacted Save the Children (www.savethechildren.org/mimi) asking how she could help. A lifelong fundraiser, she got busy with her new initiative – called Mimi's Building Blocks – and started by writing hundreds of letters to everyone she knew. She has since raised more than \$750,000 and built five 'educational centers' which provide fresh water, latrines for boys and girls, playgrounds, stone classrooms for Early Childhood Development, Primary 1-4 classes and Middle 5-8 grades. The appreciative Ethiopian families and their children's lives have been transformed.

"I find it a miracle in my life to have this incredibly productive, life-changing work," she told The Wall Street Journal in a 2011 profile. She said her work shows that if she can achieve such a thing, others can engage in their own fundraising projects and find a way to pour their passion into their own interests. For her international, philanthropic heart, the AASH is pleased to present Mimi with the Cor Unum Award.



SOUTHERN REGION Laurie Weiss Nuell, Carrollton 1975

Many may remember Laurie Weiss Nuell as the chair of the powerful, festive and uplifting 2011 National Conference in Miami. However, few may know of her behind-the-

scenes accomplishments and dedication to service for others. "Laurie is the quintessential example of demonstrating active concern for the dignity of others in our local and global community," says Maria Cristina Garcia, Carrollton Alumnae Director.

After graduating from Carrollton in 1975, Laurie studied at Tulane University, where she received her undergraduate degree in social work. She also has her master's in social work from Barry University in Miami. This education led to a life dedicated to volunteerism and non-profit leadership. Her extensive board experience is focused on health care and education and includes the Public Health Trust, which manages Jackson Memorial Hospital, the major teaching facility for the University of Miami School of Medicine, the Network of Sacred Heart Schools and Academy of the Sacred Heart, The Rosary. She was also Chair of the Board of Trustees at Carrollton.

In 2004, she became involved with Dr. Paul Farmer and his organization, Partners in Health, working to combat disease and poverty in more than a dozen countries. In Haiti, Laurie has collaborated with a team of medical professionals, architects, members of the Carrollton community and many Sacred Heart schools (via their Hearts for Haiti campaign) to open Notre Dame La Colline Community School. Consisting of two buildings that house seven classrooms, an administrative office and infirmary, it opened in February 2014 and is a dream come true following the devastation of the earthquake in 2010. This enormous undertaking was a prime example of what Maria Cristina says is one of her biggest strengths: "Laurie excels at bringing together diverse communities who share a vision."

Giving back is a family affair. Along with her sister, Jennie Weiss Block, Laurie founded the Jay Weiss Center for Social Medicine and Health Equity, named for their father who was a champion of the underserved in the Miami-Dade community. Her two daughters, Elizabeth '02 and Molly '12, are Carrollton alums, and her granddaughter, Charlotte, is a current student. We share their pride in Laurie for her accomplishments and dedication to "a social awareness which impels to action" and are happy to honor her with a Cor Unum Award.

FRANCES DUBROWSKI Climate SmART: Honoring Our Children's Future Through Faith, Art, and Action Friday, April 10, 8:30-10 a.m.

Frances Dubrowski (Newton College), project director of Honoring the Future, moderates a panel of RSCJ educators and practicing artists that will explore what climate change means for us and what we can do to build prepared, resilient, climate smART communities for our children and their children.

"What would you do if you had only a few more years to live?" When Fran sought to refocus her energies by asking that question, the answer was obvious. An environmental attorney and educator with decades of experience translating complex science into plain English, she responded: "tackle climate change, the single greatest challenge of our generation." "We all want to build a better world for our children and grandchildren," Fran reasoned, "but climate change poses a real, immediate, and potentially devastating threat to that goal."

"We have the power to craft a different future for ourselves and our children – but we must act now," she says. But, how? For Fran, the answer lies, in significant part, in art. "Art has always been the discipline through which we merge our dreams and our reality," she observes. "Art can help us realize our vision of a better future. Art compels us to reflect, helping us to make sense of our world."

So, Fran joined with colleagues to launch Honoring the Future, a nonprofit project to harness the power of art to educate, empower, and engage the public on climate change. Prominent artists like Maya Lin, James Balog, Alexis Rockman and Eve Mosher lent the project art images; several also joined the project in public panel programs to discuss how to build prepared, resilient, "climate smART communities."

This program will pose many questions: How is climate change impacting our world, especially the elderly, very young and impoverished? What will our children face if we do not take effective action? And most importantly, how does our faith influence our response?

"I'm excited to be having this discussion with the alumni and alumnae of the Sacred Heart," says Fran. "Our shared traditions, creative spirit and deep commitment to community service provide a foundation for exploring these questions in ways that can be profoundly spiritual."

Ultimately, the goal is to inspire "because there are so many simple, practical things we can do to make our lifestyles more sustainable," she says.

Melanie Guste, RSCJ, Headmistress, Academy of the Sacred Heart (The Rosary) and Facilitator, New Orleans Healthy Waters and Coastal Restoration Interest Group.

Eleanor MacLellan, RSCJ, Educator at Massachusetts Audubon Society, Drumlin Farm, reconnecting urban elementary school children to nature.

BARBARA GOULD HENRY Ruby Bridges Screening, Presentation and Q&A Friday, April 10, 12-1:45 p.m.

Newton College alumna Barbara Gould Henry has helped to make an unforgettable imprint on history. "On November 14, 1960, at the William Frantz School in New Orleans, there occurred a scene that shamed our nation and shocked the world," writes Barbara. "It was the arrival of a delicate appearing little black girl making her way with a quiet dignity and exceptional courage in the company of United States Federal Marshals to enter the formerly all-white public school, thus taking first steps in officially desegregating the city's public school system." This is the story of Ruby Bridges and her devoted teacher.

lis I took her handen nine from the hand of the Federal Muchal we made our way - then - and freser through the year - alone and together for our singular mission and lowing, personal academic adventure.

Only two years into her teaching career and just two months in New Orleans, Barbara was told, on her first day, that 'if I returned tomorrow, I would meet my new student.'"Then I knew – appalled, but determined, I was returning. And on that second day, that magical moment occurred that has forever remained as indelible as it was striking in its happening ... As I – and only I – went to greet her and then introduce myself to her, her head slightly tilted downward, offered a touching, gentle smile and then her big, gorgeous brown eyes rose to meet mine – and there and then – it was love at first sight."

Barbara bravely faced the wildly protesting mob outside the school daily, surrounded by Federal Marshals, to be with Ruby in their solitary classroom, shunned by other teachers, parents, and students. This self-sacrificing gesture brought forth a Civil Rights victory in its six-year pursuit of realizing the 1954 U. S. Supreme Court Decision decreeing the end of racially segregated public schools in our nation.

This historic event has been acknowledged by invitations to the White House by Presidents Bill Clinton and Barack Obama, guest appearances on the Oprah Winfrey show, and has been immortalized in an image portrayed by Norman Rockwell's famous painting – "The Problem We all Live With."

Last November a bronze statue of Ruby Bridges was unveiled on the 54th anniversary of her integrating the school, now known as Akili Academy Charter School, where their classroom has been restored and preserved. Barbara and Ruby — teacher and student — both attended the event.

Barbara will share a PowerPoint presentation from the movie "Ruby Bridges" during lunch in the grand ballroom of the Taj Hotel (formerly the Ritz Carlton), overlooking the historic Public Gardens.

JOHN AND MARCIE EASON AMORY "Brahmin Meets Cowgirl"



Marcie Eason Amory and her husband, John, share the story of their partnership, now 51 years strong. John is Boston born and bred, a Harvard graduate. His great, great grandfather was Major John Buttrick, who is known to have "fired the shot heard round the world."

Marcie is a self-professed, die-hard Westerner from a ranching family in Nevada. She boarded at the Convent of the Sacred Heart, Menlo (now Atherton) from 1941-52 and graduated from Lone Mountain in 1956.

After spending time in the Army, John traveled west to visit his mother in Scottsdale. With no specific plans, he met the manager of Coldwell Banker who asked if he would like to work in real estate.

As luck would have it, Marcie was working at Coldwell Banker and her desk was right in front of John's. "Voila!" she says, "The rest is history."

And history there is ... on both sides Marcie and John have connections that date back centuries.

They share a love for the mountains, open spaces, horses and boats and have three children. They currently live in Wickenburg, Ariz, (about 40 miles northwest of Scottsdale). After 55 years, John is still selling commercial real estate with the same company – now CBRichard Ellis. Marcie is Past President of AASH and especially active in the Arizona Alumnae/i Association. She is an avid volunteer and recently trained her dog for therapy work.

"He's from the East, I'm from the West, but our values, our faith, our love of family and country are airtight," says Marcie. Their story is sure to be inspiring, interesting and fun!



KATHLEEN HIRSCH
"Wise Hearts and Open Minds:
How Best Practices Can Change Our Lives"
Saturday, April 11, 2:45-4 p.m.

Kathleen Hirsch is an alumna of Nottingham Academy of the Sacred Heart in Buffalo, N.Y. (closed in 1972), where she founded the student newspaper. A regular contributor to Crux: All Things Catholic (Cruxnow.com), she is also the author of three books, a poet and teacher.

A graduate of Mount Holyoke College, she holds an M.F.A. from Brown University. For two years, Kathleen was a reporter for the Springfield Union and Sunday Republican, and later The Valley

Advocate. She began working for The Boston Phoenix in 1983, and covered the city's subcultures and marginal populations for three years, which inspired her to write "Songs From the Alley," a portrait of contemporary homelessness among women.

Following the success of her first book was a decade of freelance writing and public speaking. Her work has appeared in The Boston Globe, The Washington Post, The New York Times, The Christian Science Monitor, Boston Magazine, Ms., Working Woman, the Mississippi Review, The Georgia Review, Five Points, Orion, and was syndicated in many national newspapers.

In addition, she has written "A Home in the Heart of the City" and "Sabbath Life: One Woman's Search for Wholeness," as well as "Mothers," an anthology of fiction about motherhood (co-edited with Katrina Kenison).

For the past 15 years, Kathleen has taught at Boston College, in the PULSE program, a service-learning and social justice program dedicated to the formation of graduates who can live out the college's motto, "men and women for others." Building, bridging and sustaining "communities of value," students spend a full year in consistent service at one of nearly 60 sites in the city, learning in the process the key value of authentic connection, conversation and mutuality. Her work there has been buttressed by several recent books that emphasize the importance of mindfulness and best practices in serving others.

Kathleen is married to Mark Morrow, deputy managing editor at The Boston Globe, in charge of The Sunday Globe and investigative projects. Their son, Will, is a college junior.



WOMAN OF CONSCIENCE

Gail O'Donnell, RSCJ



"It is the countless acts of kindness and giving of herself that no one knows that make her a superb model of Christian love and understanding."

This testimonial describes Sister Gail O'Donnell, recipient of the 2015 Woman of Conscience Award, given to recognize an RSCJ for her total gift of self in the service of others.

Sister O'Donnell has spent the past three decades immersed in spiritual direction and retreat work

and "has helped many . . .find God's loving heart in times of crisis." Currently she is an adjunct faculty member at Boston College School of Theology and Ministry.

Sister O'Donnell grew up on Grande Ile, just south of Detroit, and boarded at Academy of the Sacred Heart in Grosse Pointe, Mich. A graduate of Newton College, Sister O'Donnell earned her master's in English from Manhattanville College in 1965 and began teaching in Harlem. She also taught and was Headmistress at Grosse Pointe and Nottingham in Buffalo, N.Y. (both Sacred Heart schools that have closed).

After earning her master's of divinity from Weston Jesuit School of Theology in Cambridge, Mass, Sister O'Donnell traveled to South Korea, where she taught English and theology at Song Sim College for Women in Seoul. Returning to the U.S., she became the Director of Formation for the U.S. Province, responsible for the formation of religious candidates and young professed. The Jesuits also sought her as a member of their novitiate team, a novel idea at the time to include a woman. Her international experience continued as she was appointed to the RSCJ International Formation Team in Rome. When she returned home, she headed Weston's sabbatical program as director of continuing education.

"I am humbled and grateful to receive this award — especially at an AASH meeting that is focused on 'Philanthropy of the Heart,' says Sister O'Donnell. "To me, 'philanthropy' means one gives generously from what one has received.' Each morning I ask in prayer to be an instrument of God's love. That is my deepest desire. I'm sure that is why I was drawn to and have been sustained by the charism of the Society of the Sacred Heart: to daily discover in prayer and to reveal in concrete actions the abundant love of God as revealed in Jesus. I receive this award in the name of my fellow Religious of the Sacred Heart who in so many diverse ways are philanthropists of God's love."

Sister O'Donnell has shared her gifts of self through international and national ministries in teaching, religious formation, spiritual direction and retreat work. "She is a brilliant leader who has given deeply from her heart to the Society and its associates all of her life," writes her nominator. The AASH is pleased to honor Sister O'Donnell as our 2015 Woman of Conscience.

"Woman of Conscience" was the theme of the 28th AASH biennial conference held in New York in 1991, at which a Religious of the Sacred Heart from the host region (East), Sister Joan Kirby, was recognized by the conference committee for her outstanding impact on the lives of others. Since then, the Woman of Conscience Award has been used to honor and thank an outstanding RSCJ in the host region during the conference for her shining example and for the total gift of self in the service of others.


Cristina is a 2005 graduate of Carrollton School
