

What Does "Connections through One Heart" Mean to Me?

When asked to reflect on my time at Sacred Heart, several moments and experiences stand out: my education, the opportunities presented, and the peers I have grown closer to. Yet there is something deeper and more meaningful about being a child of the Sacred Heart, a connection that cannot be easily described. At the start of my freshman year, I felt connected with the entire student body. We all had a shared love for each other, and it was even expressed to the new freshmen. However, at that point, I did not understand what the true source of that love was and how deep it ran. Now as I am halfway done my senior year, I understand that the shared love was not just a friendship between peers. Our love was a connection of sisterhood that came with being connected through our one, Sacred Heart.

What has made my Sacred Heart experience special is my ability to meet different kinds of people and join multiple clubs and organizations. As a result of our tight-knit community, I have learned and tried a variety of things. I have connected with people by creating a faith and ministry club, joining my school's diversity board, being a part of the student council, and playing on the tennis team. Although these are all different, each experience has taught me the value of being a child of the Sacred Heart and how special it is to all be connected through one heart. Further, each activity has allowed me to create friendships with students who share a common interest, and who I would not have gotten to know otherwise.

Our tennis team has students in all grade levels, with different life experiences, who bring a unique aspect to the team. However, what has always been the center of our team is our purpose to live out what it means to be a Sacred Heart student, and to live out the goals in all that we do. We approach each game with love, good sportsmanship, and open hearts to whatever is thrown our way. Regardless of athletic pressures, we put the values of the Sacred Heart first. As a result of this approach, we created a lasting community and friendship with each other. This shared bond exceeded our individual differences and reminded me that no matter where we come from or what we do, we are united in our purpose to live out the values of the Sacred Heart.

While my time at Sacred Heart has been shaped by meaningful friendships and activities I have engaged in within our school community, our connections extend far beyond our school walls. It is through my interactions with alumni and the broad network that I've witnessed how deeply our shared mission unites us, reaching across time and geography. This reality became clear to me when I met Sacred Heart alumnae for the first time. They introduced me to their families and shared their experiences at Sacred Heart, opening their hearts and lives to me after just a short time spent together. At a recent Breakfast with Santa with alumnae parents, an aluma introduced me to her family and shared a few of her favorite memories as a Sacred Heart student which I have also experienced. We shared a lighthearted conversation and after a few minutes, we felt a sense of understanding for each other. What mattered and created our bond in that moment was our shared identity as Children of the Sacred Heart. It was in my encounters with alumni that I learned how the Sacred Heart mission carries beyond graduation. It shapes lives and creates a shared community wherever the students go. This understanding deepened my appreciation for what it means to be a part of this global family, united through our shared love.

Another defining moment that deepened my understanding of this connection was the France trip with Sacred Heart. The summer entering my junior year, I traveled to the birthplace of Saint Madeleine Sophie Barat, the founder of the Society of the Sacred Heart. The Sacred Heart sisters opened their house to us and shared stories about St. Madeleine's life and mission. They made us homemade food and shared fruits and jams from their garden. The hospitality and warmth they extended felt like the physical embodiment of our collective identity through one heart. Their stories allowed me to directly connect with our foundress, and their hospitality created a bond between our school and their network in France. On the trip, we visited the room where she was born, her home parish, and the vineyard her father worked in. The experience taught me the power our shared heart had in creating connections, regardless of our lack of time together and the long distance our lives had from each other. What mattered in that instance to create unity was that we were all children of the Sacred Heart, which showed me firsthand what that truly meant. It reminded me that our shared heart has the power to unite people from different walks of life and experiences as we share a common purpose: to approach the world with open hearts and make a difference in the lives of everyone we meet.

My Sacred Heart experience has shaped the person I have become and my ability to connect with others on a meaningful level. It has taught me that the connection we share as Children of the Sacred Heart is not simply about the friendships we may form or moments we spend together, but rather a sense of unity of our shared heart. My Sacred Heart experience has made me the person I am today, someone who seeks connections in everything I do and works to always create an environment of love and support. I carry the knowledge that I am part of a global family bound by one heart, ready to make a positive impact wherever I go.

AUSCHWITZ LEGACY FELLOWSHIP AWARDED TO BLOOMFIELD HILLS GRAD/TEACHER

Former Bloomfield Hills student and current high school English & Capstone teacher Mandy Ocariz has dedicated her career to helping students not only learn history but also feel its weight. This year, that dedication was recognized in a profound way: she was selected as one of just 44 teachers across the country for the Auschwitz Legacy Fellowship. This is a year-long program, fully funded by the Auschwitz-Birkenau Memorial Foundation (ABMF), to deepen Holocaust education through intensive study and a transformative trip to Poland to visit Auschwitz-Birkenau and other historical sites.

Ocariz's passion for Holocaust education began in 2005, when she first taught *Night* to her 8th grade students. "I realized that I could not just teach the novel," she said. "I needed to teach my students about all facets of the Holocaust."

She began a pursuit to deepen her own understanding of the tragic details and stories surrounding the Holocaust, so that she could paint a more comprehensive picture of that time period for her students. To do this, she took courses at The Nancy and David Wolf Holocaust and Humanity Center and read Holocaust literature extensively. Being awarded the Auschwitz Legacy Fellowship is the next step in her ongoing journey of learning.

"I wanted my students to understand that the Holocaust should have never happened, and that it could happen again if we do not learn from the past," she says. "In my previous years of study, I felt overwhelmed by the stories and by the materials." The fellowship will allow her to "delve deeper and gather even more to take back to the classroom."

When asked how her own Sacred Heart education influenced her career path, she points to teachers who modeled both rigor and compassion. "Mrs. Boylan set incredibly high standards that you felt compelled to meet," she recalled. "Mrs. Mayer showed empathy when we needed it, but also was willing to be tough love and tell us what we needed to hear." She continues to stay connected to the Sacred Heart family today through Sr. Margaret Strom, who has "given me advice in all facets of life."

Those lessons in discipline, empathy and moral courage have continued to guide her teaching, and soon, the lessons she learns through the Auschwitz Legacy Fellowship will, too. "This educational experience," she said, "will give me an entirely new depth of knowledge that I will use to enhance my students' experiences and give them lessons that will last a lifetime."

Participating schools will include **Bryn Mawr**, **Carrollton School of the Sacred Heart** (Miami, FL), **The Rosary** (New Orleans, LA), and **Stuart**. 
SACRED HEART EDUCATORS' SYMPOSIUM

Australian Paralympic cyclist Paige Greco passed away in her home after a sudden medical episode. Greco was featured as one of the Sacred Heart olympians in the 2024 Fall issue of the Esprit de Coeur.

Greco, who was born with cerebral palsy, won the first gold medal of the pandemic-delayed Tokyo Paralympics in 2021. She broke her own world record in the women's C1-3 3,000-meter individual race. She went on to win bronze medals in the road race and time trial.

This August, she won a bronze medal at the para-cycling World Championships in Belgium for the C3 road race event.

Greco was a 2015 graduate of Sacre Coeur Glen in Iris, Victoria. She was 28 years old.

THIRD TIME'S AN EVEN BIGGER CHARM FOR THE YOUNG & THE REST OF US

For the third year running, Sacred Heart's The Young and the Rest of Us successfully completed the grueling 276.33 km, 17-stage relay around Nova Scotia's iconic Cabot Trail. In record time, I might add!

This year's team was comprised entirely of Sacred Heart alum, a PAL (Parent of an Alum), and faculty who donned the iconic fluorescent pink singlets that have defined our team's presence on

the hills (or should I say mountains?) of Cape Breton. As in past years, Fountain Academy teacher Shoneth Leadbetter took on the role of team captain, handling logistics for both The Young (recent alum) and The Rest of Us (faculty, staff, and PAL). The Cabot Trail Relay Race gets more competitive every year. This year, teams came from all over North America and included the likes of Julie-Anne Staehli, a Canadian 2021 Olympian. To keep up with the ever-quickening pace, The Young and the Rest of Us needed to pull off a record-setting race. And that we did.

From the time VP Laura Elworthy left the Gaelic College in St. Ann to the time Jon Earle '23 crossed the finish line in Baddeck, 21 hours 54 minutes and 33 seconds had elapsed. This was a significant improvement over previous performances, earning The Young and the Rest of Us a 28th-place finish among 70 ultra-competitive teams.

A lot happened in that time. Following Laura Elworthy's run, Alex Pheeney '15 and teacher Jared Griffiths laid the groundwork for Tallulah MacNeil's '22 battle up Smokey Mountain. Then followed Sophie McIntyre '16, Grace Earle '21, Sarah MacAskill '21, and PAL Mark Beland, who cruised through Cape Breton Highlands National Park to the base of the legendary North Mountain. Just as dusk was setting in, Sean Beland '22 began his trek up and down North Mountain. Next was Ryan Smith '22, who was assigned one of the race's toughest legs a mere 24 hours prior. As in past years, David Sapp '18 leveraged his quick turnover and impressive downhill running skills to take the team from the top of Mackenzie Mountain towards the outskirts of Cheticamp along some of the most breathtaking parts of the Cabot Trail. Don't ask him what it looked like, though. It was pitch-black and close to midnight when he ran.

In the early hours of Sunday morning, our night runners headed out with reflective vests and headlamps. Captain Shoneth Leadbetter was up first, followed by yours truly and Julian Cooper '24. Just as the sun was rising, Kyle Smith '17 hit the ground running towards the final stages of the relay. From there, the sibling duo Grace '21 (running a second leg) and Jon Earle '23 stormed towards the finish line, culminating in a record-setting performance for our intrepid team. With all that running, it would be easy to think that the Cabot Trail Relay is purely about athletics. But that would be wrong. Anyone who has participated in this event knows that running is just the icing on the cake of the Cabot Trail Relay. The true spirit of the event lies in community, especially for us.

Next year's race may be over 300 days away and our entry is far from guaranteed (teams must apply and be randomly selected), however, a strong performance this year and a stellar Mario-themed water stop give us hope that The Young and the Rest of Us will be back to experience the blisters and breathtaking views of the Cabot Trail Relay Race once again.
